BITE - Ballymun Initiative for Third Level Education

- Main objective to increase the participation of students from Ballymun in third-level education

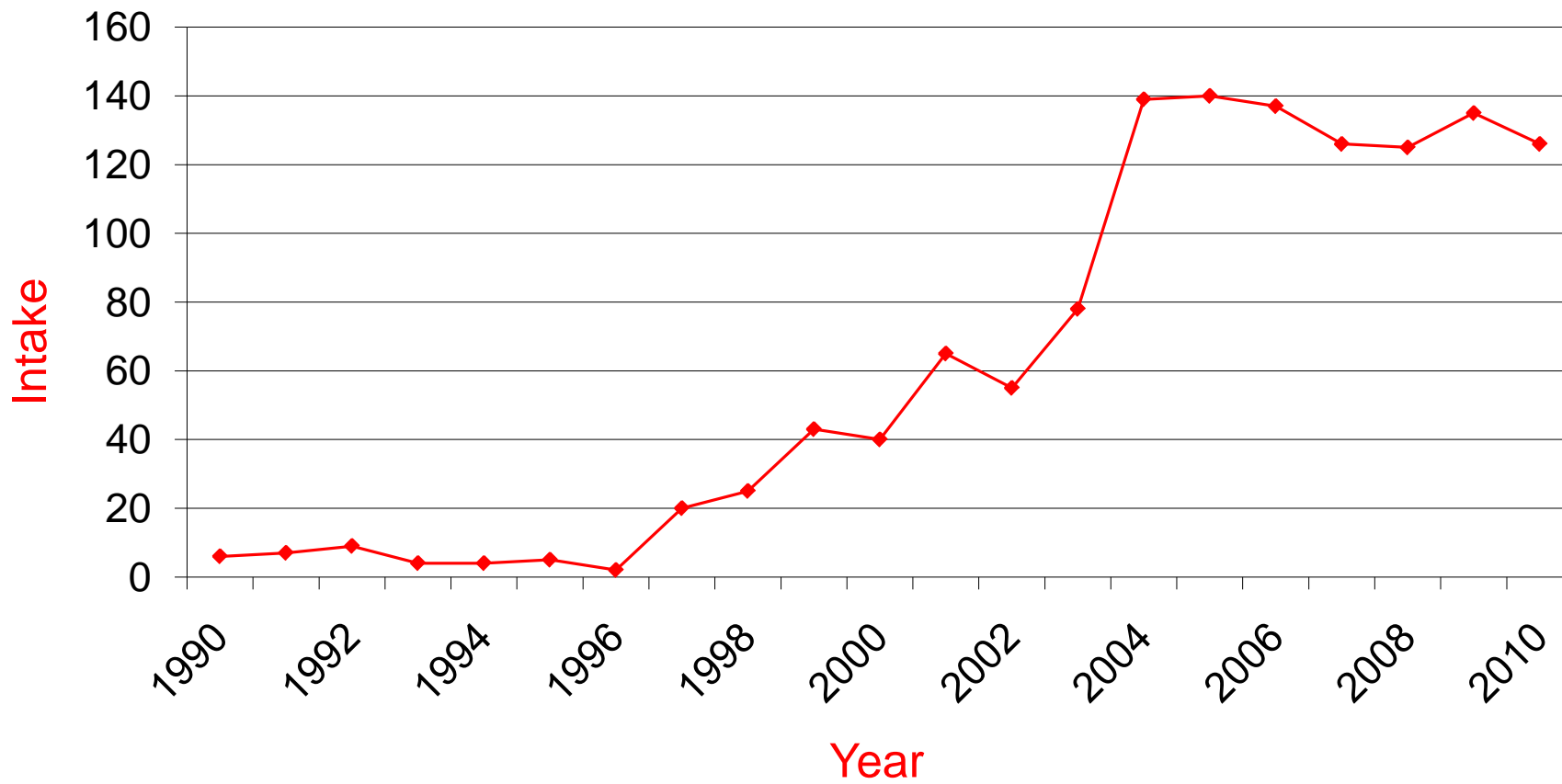
NDA - North Dublin Access programme

Preparation for Research

- Tagged

- Letters to former students: Introducing the research
- Semi-formal telephone interview
- Survey posted to small number of students unable to contact by telephone

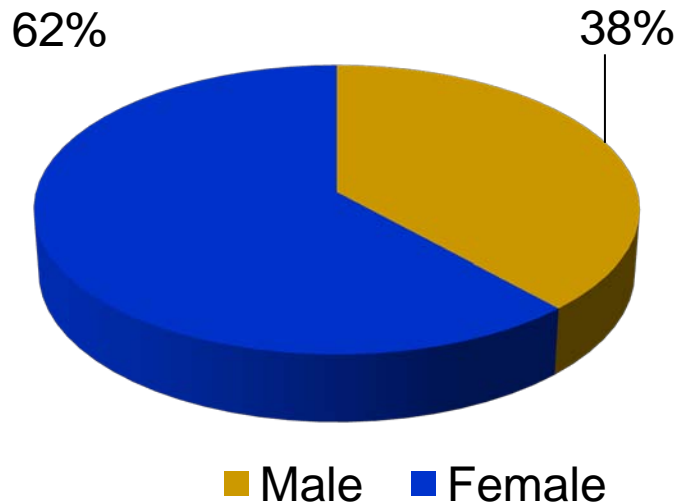

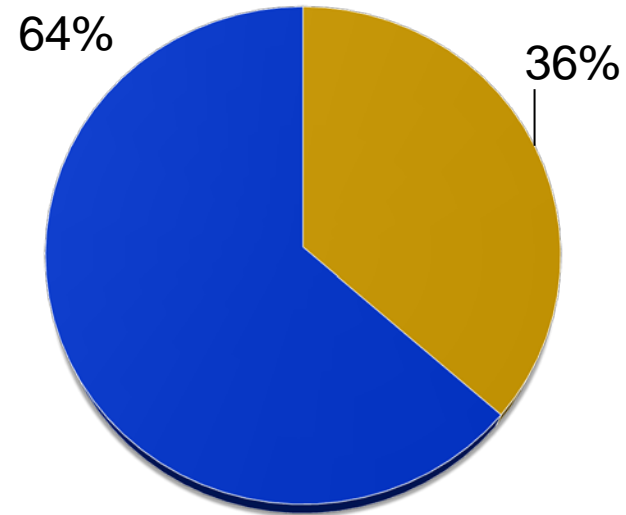

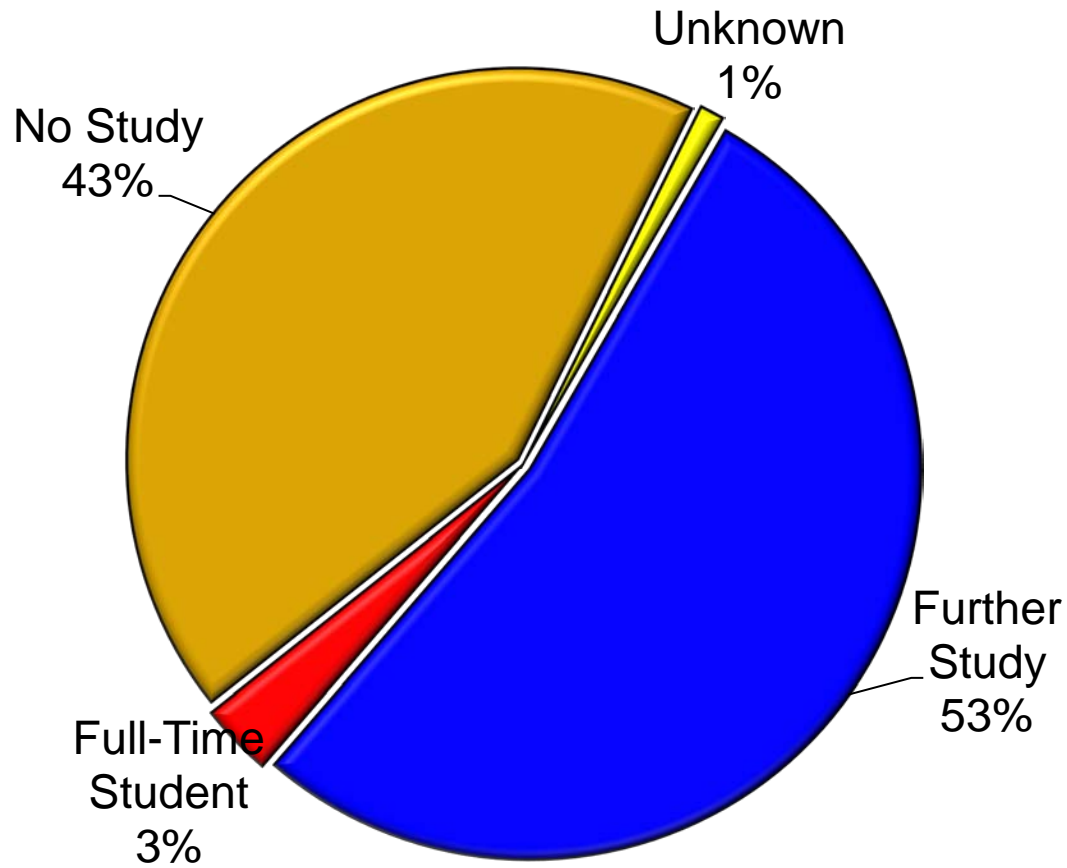

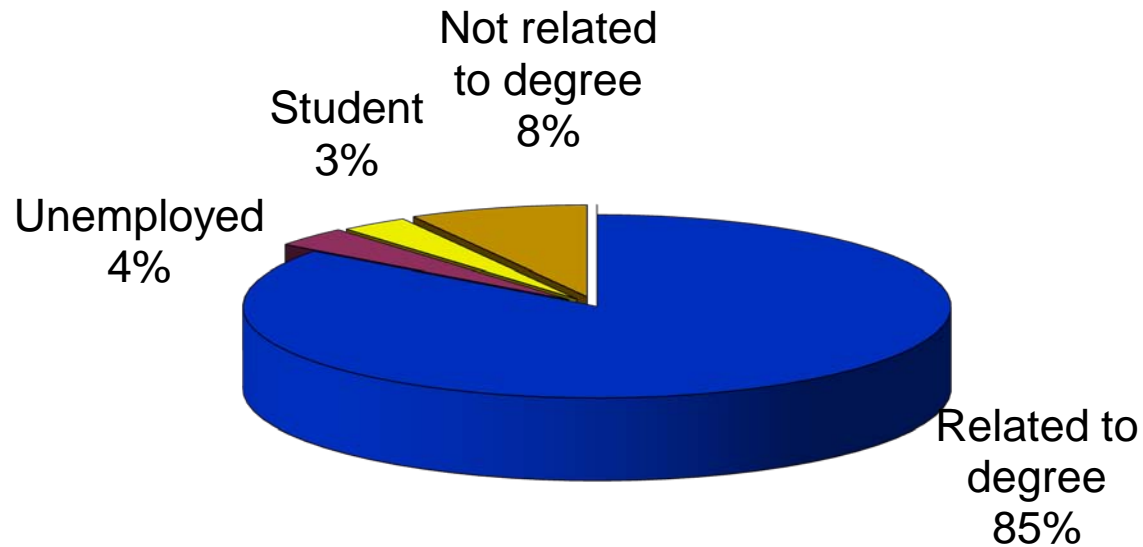
- 88 Graduates

Areas of Employment



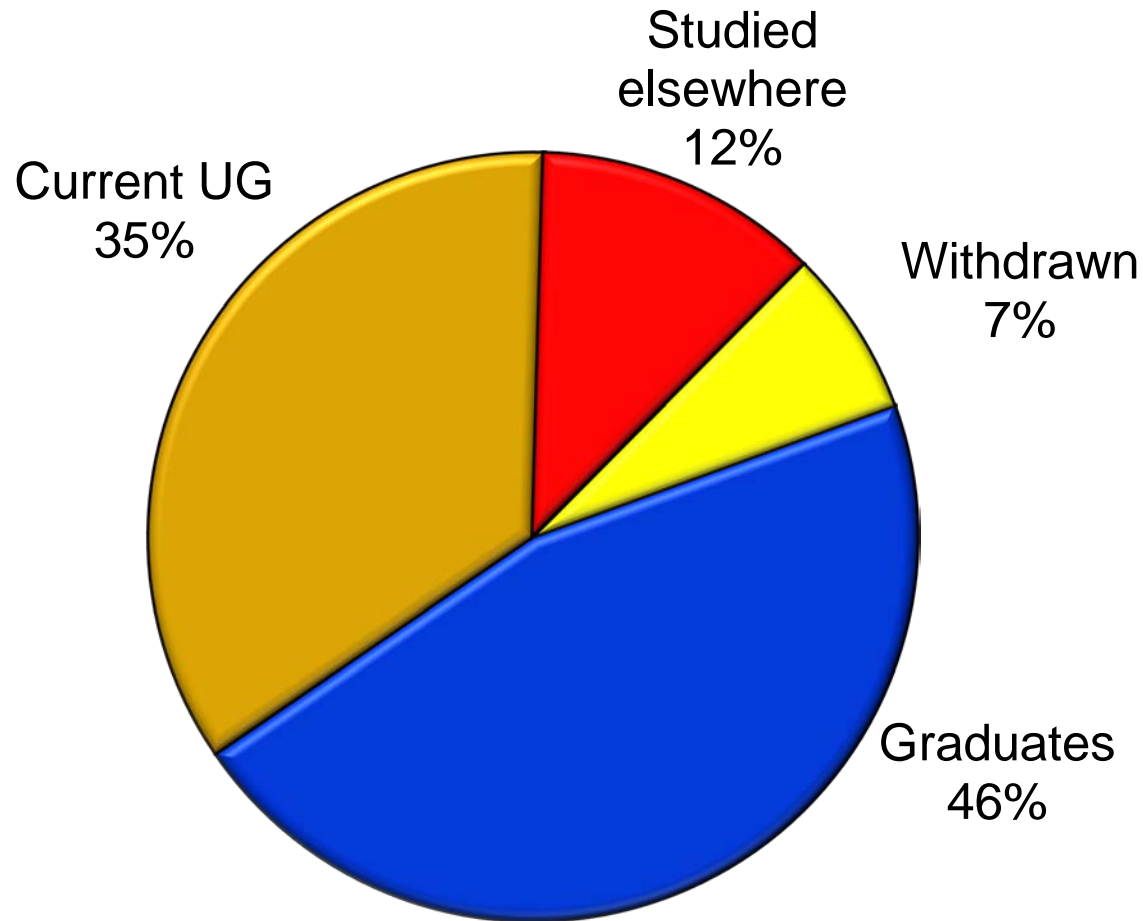

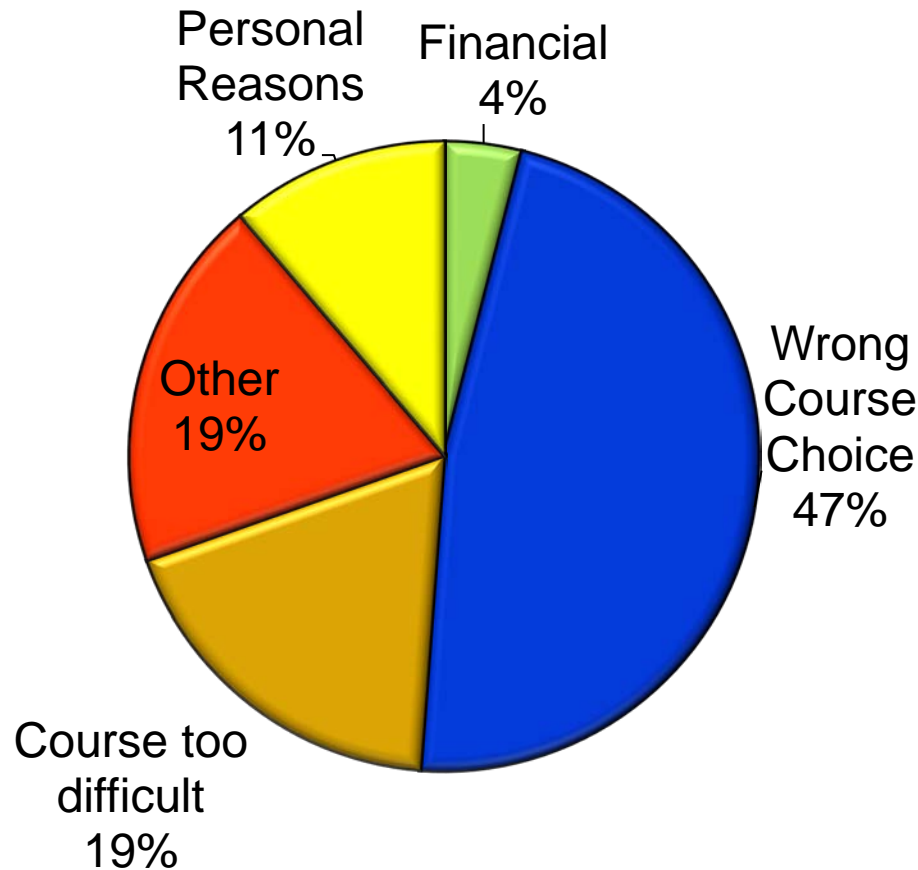
Completion of Course

93% of Access students who enter DCU complete third-level.

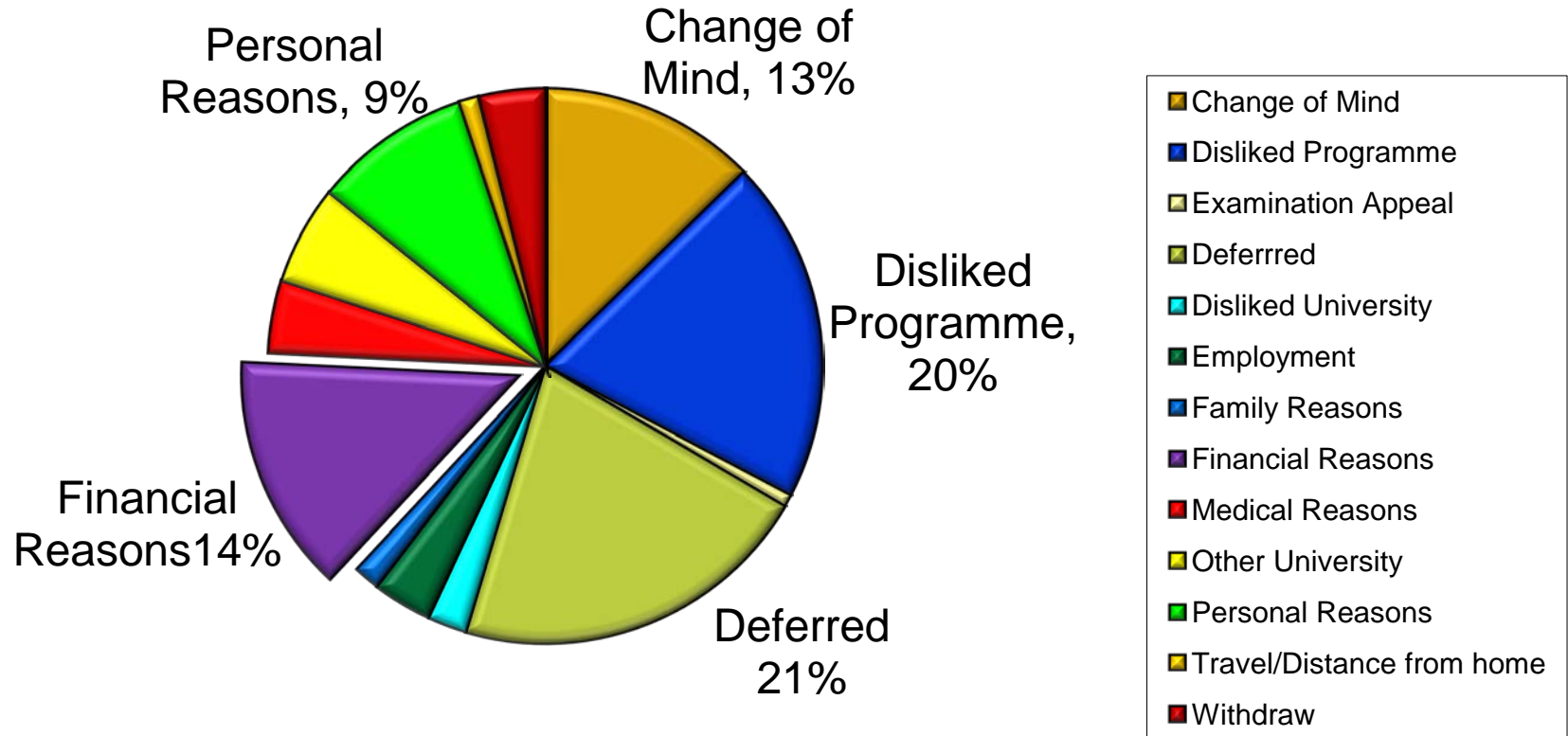
Total Breakdown

Students who did not enter DCU through the Access route are 3.5 times as likely to withdraw due to financial reasons as an Access student
